Living Our Faith

Since the invasion of Ukraine, CHMs have been saying the Rosary daily for the people of Ukraine and Russia and their leaders, refugees and those killed and injured. Other intentions, including the preservation of democratic principles and values in our country, are included as well. Several CHMs, including Sr. Catherine Linnenkamp pictured here, lead parts of the rosary.

> Each year since 2007, Sr. Delphine Vasquez has operated a monarch butterfly nursery at Humility of Mary Center beginning with the collection of eggs on milkweed. The Sisters and staff enjoy watching the caterpillars grow, form chrysalises, emerge as butterflies, and, finally, get released into St. Joseph's Courtyard. Sr. Delphine enjoys fostering the existence and multiplication of monarchs that are not only beautiful but help the environment as plant pollinators.

Water with Blessings is a non-profit program whose mission is to bring clean water to thirsty children in developing countries as well as Native American and Appalachian families in the United States. The program distributes special bucket filters to families who lack access to safe drinking water. Sisters Dolores Schuh and Lillian Stevens are helping by knitting and crocheting "socks" that fit over the water filter to serve as a cushion of protection in case the filter is dropped on a hard surface.

The Prairie beehives provide learning opportunity

Nestled amidst the tranquil embrace of nature, Our Lady of the Prairie Retreat (OLPR) stands as a beacon of devotion to both spiritual growth and ecological harmony. Our mission, deeply rooted in the belief that fostering a profound connection with the environment leads to a greater understanding of creation, is exemplified by our steadfast commitment to partnering with students for transformative ecology study projects. A recent visit by a student completing a fellowship at the University of Iowa is an example of our commitment to this strategic priority.

Oummu Kulthum Mohamed Ali Hassane visited OLPR on July 28 as part of the Mandela Washington Fellowship for Young African Leaders. At The Prairie, she and Mandela Fellowship volunteer Ann Houlihan met with Bob "the

bee guy" Roe who maintains six bee hives on site and Todd Seifert, OLPR property and operations manager.

Mohamed Ali Hassane, who is from Moroni, Grande Comore, Cosmoros, an island off the coast



of Africa, has a background in agronomy. By participating in the Mandela Washington Fellowship, she aims to expand her knowledge of entrepreneurship and learn from others, particularly in the business world in the United States. She is currently a teacher and researcher at the University of Comoros and is the founder of Island Organic Bee, which produces organic honey and honey derivatives.

Roe and Mohamed Ali Hassane shared information about the type of boxes used for storing the hives and problems like mites and diseases that affect hives. Each deal with weather issues. In Iowa, winter means moving the hives to protect the bees from the cold. In Cosmoros, it's typhoons that require the hives to be raised higher off the ground to avoid flooding.

The Mandela Washington Fellowship for Young African Leaders, a program of the US Department of State, was established in 2014. The initiative empowers participants through academic coursework, leadership training and networking. The University of Iowa participates through the college's Institute of International Business and John Pappajohn Entrepreneurial Center.



Sawubona and Ubuntu:

It takes courage to own our spiritual gifts. This is a message emphasized by Sr. Addie Lorraine Walker, SSND,

("I see you") and recognizing our interdependence ("I need you"). These concepts were related to Mary's

at the Annual CHM Assembly held at Humility of Mary Center in June. Sixty sisters and associates participated in the assembly in person, while others joined in virtually during certain times.

Sr. Addie Lorraine's presentations during the assembly were focused on contemplation, listening and understanding the call to religious life. She introduced the South African words "Sawubona" and "Ubuntu," emphasizing the importance of acknowledging and valuing others

Magnificat and the need to ponder and reflect on our charism and calling.


Sr. Addie Lorraine, a School Sister of Notre Dame for more than 40 years, is a full-time professor of pastoral theology at the Oblate School of Theology (OST) and director of Sankofa Institute for African American Pastoral Leadership. In July 2022, she was elected president of the National Black Sisters' Conference (NBSC), an organization that named her as recipient of their 2022 Harriet Tubman Award. For nine years she served

as provincial leader of the Dallas Province of SSND (2002-2011). She holds a bachelor's degree in chemistry from Southwest Texas State-San Marcos, a master's degree in theology from Xavier University in New Orleans and a doctorate in theology from Boston College.

Since 1980, her ministry commitment has been reflected in her work as a religious educator, pastoral minister and faith formator. She lectures on charism and offers retreats and spiritual direction to religious communities throughout the United States and Africa. Sr. Addie Lorraine commits her gifts to build up the people of God through education for the mind, heart and spirit. She was a speaker at the 2018 CHM Assembly and CHMs were pleased to welcome her back.

During the Assembly, participants engaged in small contemplative "listening circles" to reflect on their own names given at baptism and their individual calls as well as their

call to community in religious life. Sr. Addie Lorraine emphasized the importance of knowing, naming and noting our calling to humility in order to ponder it deeply. She related being "fully named and fully claimed" to the phrase, "Blessed are you, holy are you, holy is your name."

All persons are human "beings," not "doings," she continued. We humans were created by God to be a presence, an expression of God's love in the world for the good of the world. The call to religious life today is "to do something new... in the name of love. ... The call comes every day of my life." It is about a relationship with Jesus, about speaking for God in the face of injustice and becoming the loving person we are. She quoted Fr. Pedro Arrupe, S.J., who said, "What you are in love with...will affect everything."

Sr. Addie Lorraine also posed questions about the call of religious life today, inviting CHMs to consider what God is calling them to do, be and change. She encouraged them

not to conform to the ways of the world but to be transformed by God's will. She highlighted the capacities or gifts that religious life has for the church and the world, based on a presentation by futurist Barbara Marx Hubbard, including capacity for deep Gospel living, mystical presencing, faithfulness in responding to unmet needs, solidarity with the earth as our

speaking truth to power. As a parting invitation, Sr. Addie Lorraine suggested forming contemplative listening circles to practice humility and courage. The participants were given a list of ways in which they could engage in these practices and cultivate these qualities. The key steps are to: 1) describe the reality, 2) discern what

common home, community building, risk-taking for mission, social entrepreneurship, deep listening, dialogue and discernment, and

Scripture informs us about this reality and 3) recommend an action to the congregation on this choice to go forward.

Sister Virginia Mary Bartholome (Marita) - 80 Years

Born in Great Falls, Mont., Sr. Virginia Mary Bartholome entered the Congregation of the Humility of Mary in 1943 and made her first vows in 1946. She received a B.S. degrees in business education from Marycrest College in Davenport, Iowa, and in library science from the College of St. Catherine in St. Paul, Minn. She also has an M.S. in library science from the University of Wisconsin in Madison. Sr. Virginia Mary was a teacher and librarian in Lewistown and Great Falls, Mont. She later was the head librarian at Marycrest College in Davenport, Iowa.

Sister Joan Marie Schuster – 75 Years

Sr. Joan Marie Schuster was born in Amidon, N.D. She entered the Congregation of the Humility of Mary in 1948 and made her first profession in 1951. Sr. Joan Marie received a B.A. in elementary education from Marycrest College in Davenport, Iowa, and an M.A. in education administration from Loras College in Dubuque, Iowa. Meeting God in our human experience

Could it be that the process of transformation is simply being aware that God is everywhere and learning how to be in the presence of Divine love? At the heart of the Christian journey is the understanding that God is present and active in all human experience. I am reminded of the scripture passage from the First Letter of John: "Something which has existed since the beginning, that we have heard, and we have seen with our own eyes, that we have watched and touched with our hands, the Word who is life."

We sometimes forget that we are women and men of faith who live after the resurrection and that there is always a deeper movement of God happening in our life. Nothing is what it seems. Something sacred encircles all the busyness and complexity of life. We discover God in our human experience. Especially when we are experiencing suffering and vulnerability, God's love always intensifies in weakness. A key message of Jesus in the Gospels is "stay awake, stay awake to your experience." Jesus always met people right where they were in life and entered into relationships with those who could be truthful about their experience.

Our society in many ways encourages us to fall asleep to our experience. Daily, as people of faith, we are challenged not to exchange our experience for consumerism, busyness and routines that no longer help us know the touch of God.

Since beginning my new position as resident spiritual director at The Prairie, I have found myself intentionally inviting those who come to this sacred place to come home to their experience and the beauty of the earth and to discover God there. Sometimes it is indeed a process of decluttering and coming to know our experience, experiences of wonder, confusion, hope, faith, forgiveness, loss and gratitude.

The more I make The Prairie home, the more I believe that the original vision of Fr. Fabula and the Sisters of the Humility of Mary was to assist people to be in right relationship with themselves and the earth. In other words, to find the life and peace that God is offering right where we find ourselves in life.

Pope Francis reminds us in his encyclical, Laudato Si', that a significant part of human experience is our relationship to the earth. In other words, to be in right relationship with ourselves we must be in right and caring relationship with the earth.



The Prairie offers a variety of experiences that assist us in coming home and recognizing — truly meeting — God in our human experience and in the wonder of creation.

Allow me to close with a modern day parable quoted by Fr. Thomas Keating: A Sufi master had lost the key to his house and was looking for it in the grass outside. He got down on his hands and knees and started running his fingers through every blade of grass. Along came some of his disciples. They said, "Master, what is wrong?" He said, "I have lost the key to my house." They said, "Can we help you find it?" So they all got down on their hands and knees and started running their fingers through the grass. As the sun grew hotter, one of the more intelligent disciples said, "Master, have you any idea where you might have lost the key?" The Master replied, "Of course. I lost it in the house." To which they all exclaimed, "Then why are we looking for it out here?"

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
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
